RETIREMENT AND TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP OF POLICE K-9 "LOIS" – APPROVED

Alderwoman Evans moved the City Council approve the retirement of police K-9 Lois, approve the sale and transfer of ownership of police K-9 Lois and authorize the Mayor to sign the agreement. Motion seconded by Alderman Podrygula.

Captain Sundbakken said, Lois has served the Police Department for six years and 4 months partnered with Officer Laudenschlager as her handler. Since he has submitted his resignation, the amount of training needed to partner Lois with another handler would exceed her useful career.

Alderman Podrygula asked about plans to replace the K-9 and requested they expedite the process.

Captain Sundbakken responded by saying, the first step is to identify a handler and then sometime in the next year will start the process to purchase another dog. All of the K-9s are vital to their operations and offer a resource that humans can't fill.

The City Manager added, it is customary for the handler to retain the K-9 after retirement. The average working life span is about seven years so the cost and effort to retain Lois and train a new handler wouldn't be worth it. He mentioned that communities are typically very supportive of the K-9 program. The City can and will sustain a replacement however, if there are sponsors in the community who want to participate, they can reach out to Chief Klug or Mr. Stewart.

Whereupon a vote was taken on the above motion by Alderwoman Evans, seconded by Alderman Podrygula and carried by the following roll call vote: ayes: Evans, Jantzer, Olson, Pitner, Podrygula, Ross, Sipma; nays: none.

FERGUSON BOOKS & MORE- SUCCESS DEPOT RENTAL – APPROVED

Alderwoman Olson moved the City Council approve the request from Dane Ferguson of Ferguson Books & More, to conduct a pop-up sale at the Success Depot July 16-17, 2021. Motion seconded by Alderman Jantzer.

Alderwoman Evans asked if the City usually allows rental of City property.

Mr. Stewart responded by saying, staff is currently working to draft a policy regarding rental of City property. This situation arose because the business had an agreement with the previous property owner. The rental income will be received as program income for the City Hall project through the NDR program. The City does not typically allow rental of property for private profit.

Whereupon a vote was taken on the motion by Alderwoman Olson, seconded by Alderman Jantzer and carried by the following roll call vote: ayes: Evans, Jantzer, Olson, Pitner, Podrygula, Ross, Sipma; nays: none.

RESOLUTION NO. 3723 - DOWNTOWN FAÇADE IMPROVEMENT FORGIVABLE LOAN PROGRAM – APPROVED

Alderman Pitner moved the City Council adopt resolution no. 3723 establishing a Façade Improvement Program in the form of a forgivable loan for properties in the Central Business District, and adopting program guidelines and design standards. Motion seconded by Alderwoman Evans.

Margie Bolton, of Margie's Art Glass, addressed the Council. She said the program is very much needed for downtown and she is excited about the opportunity. The older buildings make it hard for owners to make the enhancements they would really like to such as improving accessibility. They can't afford all the improvements on their own.

Jonathan Rosenthal, Economic Development Administrator, said now that money has been allocated, they can proceed with confidence. He gave a presentation describing their focus on redevelopment efforts while keeping the heart of Minot strong. He provided a summary of the numerous studies which all agreed that redevelopment downtown would drive economic growth. Now that the infrastructure has been replaced, the next step is to address the physical conditions of downtown Minot. He gave examples of buildings who could benefit from the program and explained the approach and application process.

Following the presentation, Alderwoman Evans asked what would happen if the property were sold before the ten-year time frame expired.

Mr. Rosenthal said, transfers are permitted as long as the new owner continues to maintain the improvements.

Mr. Stewart added, another option would be to repay the cost of the improvements.

Alderman Ross asked how to defend this project to a constituent with a business in another part of town who does not benefit from the program.

Mr. Rosenthal said, there are other projects for different areas of town such as the beautification plan on Broadway. Downtown was built prior to adopting current building codes and is need of investment.

Mayor Sipma responded by saying, economic development specialists have all identified downtowns of middle America as a draw for tourism. Downtown was identified as an asset highlighted by programs like the Main Street Initiative to attract business to unique areas.

Alderman Ross noted that he is not opposed to downtown but has heard concerns from other segments of the community.

Alderman Pitner thanked everyone for working to get the program in place. He said he is in favor of all projects that support businesses in Minot but this is the project before them and is the first of many community programs. They need to focus on investing downtown especially because of Trinity vacating their downtown buildings. Improvements to the buildings in downtown will make them more attractive to new businesses and the workforce.

Alderman Podrygula agreed with the previous comments but emphasized the importance of investing downtown. He compared Minot to other communities who have successfully strengthened their downtown economies.

Rod Wilson with Northern Sentry and president of the Downtown Business & Professional Association, explained that it is their mission make downtown better. He pointed out the struggles many businesses are facing to retain their workforce and attract business. The program will help business owners make much needed improvements to their properties to make downtown more attractive.

Sherry McGlaughlin, addressed Alderman Ross's comments by saying, she owns businesses both in downtown, and other locations in the city. She believes they can easily defend the need to revitalize downtown. She said, she personally will not be applying for the program but supports other businesses who will apply. Downtown is the heart of Minot and is in need of investment regardless of what takes place in other areas of Minot.

Whereupon a vote was taken on the above motion by Alderman Pitner seconded by Alderwoman Evans and carried by the following roll call vote: ayes: Evans, Jantzer, Olson, Pitner, Podrygula, Ross, Sipma; nays: none.

RECYCLING TRANSFER STATION AND NEW LANDFILL ENTRANCE APPROVE PLANS AND SPECS (PROJECT NUMBER 4580) – APPROVED

Alderman Pitner moved the City Council approve the plans and specifications for the Recycling Transfer Facility and New Landfill Entrance and authorize a call for bids. Motion seconded by Alderwoman Evans.

Alderman Jantzer said, he supports the motion and believes there is a significant desire for curbside recycling. They need to move forward with this in order to get an accurate cost estimate for the overall program. He then requested staff update their projections for other aspects of recycling, considering fuel costs and the market for recyclable materials.

Upon questioning by Alderwoman Evans regarding the timeline, Mr. Sorenson explained they have already encountered delays. The plans are now about 70% complete and they should have numbers in the next couple months. He suggested spring 2023 is a reasonable target since they wouldn't distribute new bins during winter.

Whereupon a vote was taken on the above motion by Alderman Pitner seconded by Alderwoman Evans and carried by the following roll call vote: ayes: Evans, Jantzer, Olson, Pitner, Podrygula, Ross, Sipma; nays: none.

DENY NEW LANDFILL INVESTIGATION TASK ORDER (PROJECT NUMBER 4545) – APPROVED

Alderwoman Olson moved the City Council deny the request to authorize the Mayor to sign the task order for the New Landfill Investigation with CPS, Ltd. Motion seconded by Alderwoman Evans.

Alderwoman Olson stated, the issue has been discussed a lot over many years and she understands the frustration but believes it would be difficult, if not impossible to find land. Another study is not the best use of funds. Denying the investigation would set clear direction for staff to focus elsewhere.

Alderman Podrygula said he believes recycling should improve capacity issues at the landfill and relocating the entrance should help the neighborhood with some traffic. His concern however, is that the Council told citizens they would look elsewhere to relocate a landfill and he is hesitant to go back on their word. He commented that some things have changed and there is a lot on their plate and many other uses for funds.

Mayor Sipma stated, the former Public Works Director spent a decade looking for land and believes this investigation will take \$370,000 and come to the same conclusion. Minot is already supporting the region in regards to NAWS, Flood Control, and the oil boom. Relocating the landfill would cost sanitation customers double or triple the current rate for the benefit of the whole region.

Alderman Jantzer said the issue has been before them numerous times and at the present time, he would prefer not to spend the money to reach the same conclusion.

Alderman Pitner disagreed and said they told the citizens they would investigate further. Until an investigation is done, they don't know if there is a better site for a landfill. When they toured the current site, they saw the issues in person.

Alderwoman Evans supported the motion. She said she spoke with former Alderman Hatlelid about the history of looking for a new site and believes the process has been done.

Mr. Stewart said he understands the complexity of the issue. The current landfill has growth capacity and they have done their due diligence. Relocating a landfill is difficult and they will always have the "not in my backyard" issue. The same problems exist across the country. The most cost-effective solution for the next 10-20 years, however, is to stay at the current location. The process to move costs millions of dollars even beyond purchasing land. There are regulatory and environmental issues to deal with. At a national level, it is becoming more evident that the federal government will have to get involved at some point.

Whereupon a vote was taken on the above motion by Alderwoman Olson, seconded by Alderwoman Evans and carried by the following roll call vote: ayes: Evans, Jantzer, Olson, Ross, Sipma; nays: Pitner, Podrygula
